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

1. Irreversible death is permanent

2. Final all functioning stops with death

3. Inevitable death universal for all living things

4. Causality what causes death

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General tips for talking with grandchildren about death:

- Listen and observe
- 2. Only answer what is being asked
- 3. Your grandchildren are not you; clarify your own beliefs
- 4. Normalizing the conversation
- 5. Recognize that grandchildren learn from other sources
- 6. Share proactively when appropriate
- 7. It's OK to not know all the answers

Ages & Stages

Toddlers/Preschoolers

- See death as temporary
- Concrete thinkers
- Language matters/no euphemisms

Elementary School Aged Children

- Understand finality of death
- Worry about what will happen to THEM

Tweens/Young Teens

- Understand death, confused emotions about it
- Start thinking "philosophically" about death
- Often have feelings of guilt/regret

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
